### Coolsaet turns in fast run in meet in California

PALO ALTO, CALIF.

Reid Coolsaet of Guelph's Speed River Track and Field Club ran the fourth-fastest 10,000 metres time ever by a Canadian with a clocking of 27:56.92 at the Payton Jordan Invitational in Palo Alto, Calif.

Coolsaet's time qualifies him for this year's world championships in Osaka, Japan, and provisionally qualifies him for next year's Olympic Games in Beijing.

Also at the meet, Speed River teammate Eric Gillis recorded a personal best time of 28:42.23 in the same event. This time ranks Gillis third in Canada and qualifies him for the this year's World University Games.

# Raptors knocked out

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J.

Richard Jefferson saved the Nets from another trip to Toronto—and sent them instead to the second round.

Jefferson made the go-ahead basket with 8.3 seconds left, stole a pass on the next possession, and New Jersey beat the Raptors 98-97 last night to win the first-round series 4-2.

After underachieving for most of the season, the Nets put it together down the stretch and now head to Cleveland for Game 1 of the Eastern Conference semifinals tomorrow.

Jason Kidd finished with 18 points, 15 assists and eight rebounds for the Nets, averaging a triple-double for the series. Jefferson scored 24 points and Vince Carter added 21 despite shooting 6-of-19 from the field.


Chris Bosh had 23 points, nine assists and seven rebounds for the Atlantic Division champion Raptors. But Jose Calderon's pass to him was intercepted by Jefferson, sending the Raptors to their ninth straight road postseason loss.

After four dismal games in New Jersey this season, Bosh was terrific this time, scoring 13 points in the fourth quarter. He banked in a jumper with 47 seconds left, giving the Raptors a 97-96

But after a timeout, Jefferson drove into the lane and rose over Bosh for his layup. The Raptors then tried to find Bosh cutting to the basket, but Jefferson came away with Calderon's pass and put the Nets back into the conference semifinals. They lost to Miami in that round last year.

Toronto got inspired efforts from banged-up point guards T.J. Ford and Calderon, who combined for 33 points. But the best point guard on the floor, as usual, was Kidd, who averaged 14 points, 13.2 assists and 10 rebounds to became the first player to average a triple-double for a series since he did it against Boston in the 2002 Eastern Conference final.

Ford and Calderon both were forced to leave Game 5 with injuries. Calderon, usually the backup, started because Ford hadn't practised since sustaining neck, shoulder and arm injuries in a collision with Carter early in Tuesday's game.

Calderon sprained his ankle in the final seconds of that one, but told coach Sam Mitchell he could play after taking part in the morning shootaround.

Mitchell said before the game that the start was important after the Nets dominated the first quarters in Games 3 and 4, which were never close. This time, Toronto shot 50 per cent and limited New Jersey to 37.5 per cent in the first 12 minutes, which ended in a 21-21

Ford entered late in the first quarter and was 6-of-7 for 13 points in the second, helping the Raptors take a 46-43 in-

The Nets trailed 65-64 with under three minutes left in the third quarter before Kidd found Jefferson with an alley-oop pass on the break, made a pair of free throws, and set up Jason Collins for a layup and a five-point lead with 1:51 remaining. He assisted on Bostjan Nachbar's three-pointer with 21 seconds to go in the period as New Jersey brought a 75-68 lead to the fourth.

# Sabres slip by Rangers in OT

The Buffalo Sabres are one win away from reaching the ▲ NHL's Eastern Conference final for the second year in a

It sure didn't look that way through 59 minutes last night. Maxim Afinogenov, a healthy scratch in Game 4, scored 4:39 into overtime as the Sabres beat the New York Rangers 2-1 in Game 5 of their Eastern Conference semifinal series to lead the best-of-seven showdown three games to two.

The goal came with Buffalo on the power play, the Sabres connecting for the first time on six chances on the night and only their fourth power-play goal in 31 chances for the series.

The Sabres avoided what looked like sure defeat until captain clutch Chris Drury tied it with eight seconds left in the third period, setting up Afinogenov's overtime heroics, the Russian winger powering a blast from the point that beat Henrik Lundqvist through the five-hole.

Afinogenov dove to centre ice in celebration, mobbed by his teammates, a sellout crowd of 18,690 at HSBC Arena going berserk.

Game 6 goes tomorrow afternoon at Madison Square Garden in New York (TSN, 2 p.m. ET) and no doubt Lundqivst and Buffalo's Ryan Miller will once again treat fans to a netminder's duel.

Lundqvist was superb in defeat, stopping 39 of 41 shots. Miller stopped 21 of 22 shots.

Martin Straka had given the Rangers a 1-0 lead with 3:17 to go in the third period when his wrist shot from the left  $% \left( 1\right) =\left( 1\right) \left( 1\right)$ faceoff circle eluded Miller and beat him stick side just under the crossbar. The puck came out so fast a video review was needed to verify the goal, but Straka already knew it, celebrating with his Rangers teammates.

The crowd was stunned, the home team having dominated on the shot clock and in scoring chances, but not on the scoresheet.

But they were on their feet with eight seconds left with Drury tying it when he slipped in a rebound from the side of the net and Miller on the bench for a sixth attacker, setting up overtime in the pivotal game of the series.

# Kentucky Derby bucking traditions

LOUISVILLE, KY.

Tt's anybody's Kentucky Derby, where Lthere's no super horse, and superstar trainers Bob Baffert, D. Wayne Lukas and Nick Zito are all absent for the first time since 1980.

The sad saga of last year's winner, Barbaro, looms large over the field of 20 three-year-olds, many of whom are defying tradition by running off long layoffs or after training on artificial surfaces.

Curlin, sired by Canadian-bred Smart Strike, is the 7-2 morning-line favourite for the US\$2 million race, having won all three career starts by a combined 28 1/2 lengths.

"There are expectations, but it comes from you," said Steve Asmussen, who also trains long-shot Zanjero. "Pressure, I would think, is running one who isn't fast enough.

Street Sense, the 4-1 second choice, faces a double jinx at his hometown track. No Breeders' Cup Juvenile winner has returned to Churchill Downs in the spring to wear the blanket of roses in 23 tries; and no two-year-old champion has won since Spectacular Bid did 28 years ago.

And trainer Todd Pletcher is counting on one of his five horses to improve his 0-for-14 Derby record.

Threatened thunderstorms could turn the dirt racing strip into a quagmire. Highs of around 26 C are forecast, along with a 60 per cent chance of rain, possibly as much as a quarter of an inch. At least the race's royal guest will feel at home.

Queen Elizabeth II, who owns racehorses, will stop off to watch her first Derby after a trip to Jamestown, Va., to celebrate the 400th anniversary of America's first permanent English set-
